# On nonlinear Feynman–Kac formulas for viscosity solutions of semilinear parabolic partial differential equations

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#### Abstract

The classical Feynman–Kac identity builds a bridge between stochastic analysis and partial differential equations (PDEs) by providing stochastic representations for classical solutions of linear Kolmogorov PDEs. This opens the door for the derivation of sampling based Monte Carlo approximation methods, which can be meshfree and thereby stand a chance to approximate solutions of PDEs without suffering from the curse of dimensionality. In this article we extend the classical Feynman–Kac formula to certain semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs. More specifically, we identify suitable solutions of stochastic fixed point equations (SFPEs), which arise when the classical Feynman–Kac identity is formally applied to semilinear Kolmorogov PDEs, as viscosity solutions of the corresponding PDEs. This justifies, in particular, employing full-history recursive multilevel Picard (MLP) approximation algorithms, which have recently been shown to overcome the curse of dimensionality in the numerical approximation of solutions of SFPEs, in the numerical approximation of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs.

## <span id="page-1-0"></span>1 Introduction

The classical Feynman–Kac identity (see, e.g., [\[15,](#page-51-0) [18,](#page-52-0) [28,](#page-52-1) [38\]](#page-53-0)) builds a bridge between stochastic analysis and partial differential equations (PDEs) by providing stochastic representations for classical solutions of linear Kolmogorov PDEs. The fact that certain solutions of linear Kolmogorov PDEs can be expressed as appropriate averages of Itô processes associated with these PDEs opens the door for the derivation of sampling based Monte Carlo approximation methods, which can be meshfree and thereby stand a chance to approximate solutions of PDEs without suffering from the curse of dimensionality. Since PDEs in applications are not always linear, an extension of the classical Feynman–Kac formula to nonlinear PDEs is desirable. One approach to nonlinear Feynman–Kac type formulas passes through backward stochastic differential equations (BSDEs); see, e.g., [\[7,](#page-51-1) [35\]](#page-53-1) for references on BSDEs and see, e.g., [\[2,](#page-51-2) [3,](#page-51-3) [19,](#page-52-2) [20,](#page-52-3) [32,](#page-52-4) [33,](#page-53-2) [34,](#page-53-3) [36,](#page-53-4) [37,](#page-53-5) [38,](#page-53-0) [39,](#page-53-6) [41,](#page-53-7) [43\]](#page-53-8) for references on the connection between BSDEs and PDEs. The approach which is pursued in this article is to identify suitable solutions of stochastic fixed point equations (SFPEs), which arise when the classical Feynman–Kac identity is formally applied to semilinear Kolmorogov PDEs by treating the nonlinearity as mere inhomogeneity, as viscosity solutions of the corresponding PDEs; see, e.g., [\[8,](#page-51-4) [9,](#page-51-5) [10,](#page-51-6) [18,](#page-52-0) [26\]](#page-52-5) for references on viscosity solutions of PDEs. More specifically, we establish in this article a one-to-one correspondence between viscosity solutions of certain semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs and solutions of the associated SFPEs (see Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) in Section [3.3](#page-41-0) below). This justifies, in particular, employing full-history recursive multilevel Picard (MLP) approximation algorithms (see [\[6,](#page-51-7) [12,](#page-51-8) [16,](#page-51-9) [21,](#page-52-6) [22,](#page-52-7) [23,](#page-52-8) [24,](#page-52-9) [25\]](#page-52-10) for references on MLP approximation algorithms), which have been shown to overcome the curse of dimensionality in the numerical approximation of solutions of SFPEs, in the numerical approximation of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs. MLP approximation algorithms are the first and up to now only methods which have been shown to overcome the curse of dimensionality in the numerical approximation of solutions of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs. To illustrate the findings of this article, we now present in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) below a special case of Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) which is the main result of this article.

<span id="page-1-1"></span>**Theorem 1.1.** Let  $d \in \mathbb{N}$ ,  $L, T \in (0, \infty)$ , let  $\mu \colon \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^d$  and  $\sigma \colon \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^{d \times d}$  be locally Lipschitz continuous, let  $f \in C(\mathbb{R}^d \times \mathbb{R}, \mathbb{R})$ ,  $g \in C(\mathbb{R}^d, \mathbb{R})$  be at most polynomially growing, let  $\|\cdot\| : \mathbb{R}^d \to$  $[0, \infty)$  be the standard Euclidean norm on  $\mathbb{R}^d$ , let  $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle \colon \mathbb{R}^d \times \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}$  be the standard Euclidean scalar product on  $\mathbb{R}^d$ , assume for all  $x, y \in \mathbb{R}^d$ ,  $v, w \in \mathbb{R}$  that  $\langle x, \mu(x) \rangle \leq L(1 + ||x||^2)$ ,  $||\sigma(x)y|| \leq$  $L(1 + ||x||) ||y||$  $L(1 + ||x||) ||y||$  $L(1 + ||x||) ||y||$ , and  $|f(x, v) - f(x, w)| \le L|v - w|$ , let  $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P}, (\mathbb{F}_t)_{t\in[0,T]})$  be a stochastic basis<sup>1</sup>, and let  $W: [0, T] \times \Omega \to \mathbb{R}^d$  be a standard  $(\mathbb{F}_t)_{t \in [0, T]}$ -Brownian motion. Then

with  $u(T,x) = g(x)$  for  $(t,x) \in (0,T) \times \mathbb{R}^d$ ,

<span id="page-1-4"></span>(ii) for every  $t \in [0, T]$ ,  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$  there exists an up to indistinguishability unique  $(\mathbb{F}_s)_{s \in [t, T]}$ -adapted stochastic process  $X^{t,x} = (X_s^{t,x})_{s \in [t,T]} : [t,T] \times \Omega \to \mathbb{R}^d$  with continuous sample paths satisfying

that for all  $s \in [t, T]$  we have P-a.s. that

<span id="page-2-2"></span>(iii) there exists a unique at most polynomially growing  $v \in C([0, T] \times \mathbb{R}^d, \mathbb{R})$  which satisfies for all  $t \in [0, T]$ ,  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$  that  $\mathbb{E}[g(X_T^{t,x})]$  $\int_T^{t,x} |f(X_s^{t,x}, v(s, X_s^{t,x}))| ds] < \infty$  and

and

<span id="page-2-3"></span>(iv) we have for all  $t \in [0, T]$ ,  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$  that  $u(t, x) = v(t, x)$ .

Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) above is an immediate consequence of Corollary [3.9.](#page-44-0) Corollary [3.9,](#page-44-0) in turn, follows from Corollary [3.8](#page-43-0) which itself is a special case of Theorem [3.7,](#page-41-1) the main result of this article. Let us comment on some of the mathematical objects appearing in Theorem [1.1.](#page-1-1) The real number  $L \in (0, \infty)$  in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) above is used to formulate a growth condition, a coercivity type condition, and a Lipschitz continuity condition on the functions  $\mu \colon \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^d$ ,  $\sigma \colon \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^{d \times d}$ , and  $f: \mathbb{R}^d \times \mathbb{R} \to \mathbb{R}$ . The real number  $T \in (0, \infty)$  specifies the time horizon of the PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3) in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) above. The functions  $\mu: \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^d$  and  $\sigma: \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^{d \times d}$  in Theorem 1.1 above determine the random dynamics in [\(2\)](#page-2-0) and specify the linear part of the PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3). The assumption that the functions  $\mu: \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^d$  and  $\sigma: \mathbb{R}^d \to \mathbb{R}^{d \times d}$  in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) are locally Lipschitz continuous, the assumption that  $\sigma$  is at most linearly growing, and the assumption that  $\mu$  satisfies a coercivity type condition, i.e., the assumption that for all  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$  we have that  $\langle x, \mu(x) \rangle \leq L(1 + ||x||^2)$ , roughly speaking, prevent local solutions of the stochastic differential equation (SDE) in [\(2\)](#page-2-0) from blowing up (see, e.g., Gyöngy & Krylov [\[17\]](#page-52-12)). The function  $f \in C(\mathbb{R}^d \times \mathbb{R}, \mathbb{R})$  in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) represents the nonlinearity of the semilinear Kolmogorov PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3). The function  $g \in C(\mathbb{R}^d, \mathbb{R})$  in Theorem [1.1,](#page-1-1) in turn, specifies the terminal condition of the semilinear Kolmogorov PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3). Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) proves, in particular, the unique existence of an at most polynomially growing viscosity solution  $u$ of the PDE in  $(1)$  and, moreover, shows that u is the unique at most polynomially growing solution of the SFPE in [\(3\)](#page-2-1). Related results can be found, e.g., in El Karoui et al. [\[13,](#page-51-10) Theorem 8.5], Kalinin [\[27,](#page-52-13) Theorem 2.3], Ma & Zhang [\[33,](#page-53-2) Theorem 4.2], Pardoux [\[34,](#page-53-3) Theorem 4.6], Pardoux & Peng [\[36,](#page-53-4) Theorem 4.3], Pardoux & Tang [\[39,](#page-53-6) Theorem 5.1], Pardoux et al. [\[37,](#page-53-5) Theorem 4.1], and Peng [\[41,](#page-53-7) Theorem 3.2]. Note that, roughly speaking, these results are, on the one hand, more general than Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) above with regard to the assumptions on the nonlinearity  $f$  in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) and, on the other hand, less general than Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) above with regard to the assumptions on the coefficients  $\mu$  and  $\sigma$  of the SDE in [\(2\)](#page-2-0) in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) above. In addition, observe that in general the viscosity solution  $u \in C([0, T] \times \mathbb{R}^d, \mathbb{R})$  of the PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3) fails to be a classical solution of the PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3). Indeed, Hutzenthaler et al. [\[18\]](#page-52-0) implies that there exist admissible choices for the functions  $\mu$ ,  $\sigma$ , and g in Theorem [1.1](#page-1-1) such that the unique at most polynomially growing viscosity solution of the PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3) with  $f = (\mathbb{R}^d \times \mathbb{R} \ni (x, a) \mapsto 0 \in \mathbb{R})$  is not locally Hölder continuous (cf., e.g., Elworthy [\[14\]](#page-51-11) and Li & Scheutzow [\[30\]](#page-52-14) for related results). Next we comment on the proof of Theorem [1.1.](#page-1-1) Item [\(ii\)](#page-1-4) is well-known in the scientific literature (see, e.g., Gyöngy & Krylov [\[17\]](#page-52-12)) and Item [\(iii\)](#page-2-2) follows from [\[5,](#page-51-12) Corollary 3.10]. In order to prove Items [\(i\)](#page-1-5) and [\(iv\)](#page-2-3) we first show in Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) in Section [2.5](#page-20-0) (see also the proof of Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) in Section [3.3\)](#page-41-0) that the unique at most polynomially growing solution of the SFPE in [\(3\)](#page-2-1) is a viscosity solution of the PDE in [\(1\)](#page-1-3) and, thereafter, we show in Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) in Section [3.1](#page-27-0) that there is at most one at most polynomially growing viscosity solution of the terminal value problem in Item [\(i\)](#page-1-5).

The remainder of this article is organized as follows. Section [2](#page-3-0) is concerned with a Feynman– Kac representation result for viscosity solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs; see Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) in Section [2.5.](#page-20-0) Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) is proved by combining a well-known approximation argument (see Corollary [2.20](#page-17-0) in Section [2.3\)](#page-15-0) with a well-known result for Feynman–Kac representations of classical solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs (see Lemma [2.2](#page-5-0) in Section [2.1\)](#page-4-0) and an essentially well-known approximation result for SDEs (see Lemma [2.21](#page-18-1) in Section [2.4\)](#page-18-0). The notion of viscosity solutions as well as some basic properties of viscosity solutions are recalled in Section [2.2.](#page-8-0) Section [3](#page-26-0) deals with existence, uniqueness, and Feynman– Kac representation results for viscosity solutions of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs. In Section [3.1](#page-27-0) we establish suitable uniqueness results for suitable viscosity solutions of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs (see Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) in Section [3.1\)](#page-27-0). In Section [3.2](#page-39-0) we reprove an essentially well-known existence result for solutions of SDEs which is originally due to Gyöngy & Krylov [\[17\]](#page-52-12). Finally, in Section [3.3,](#page-41-0) we combine the existence and uniqueness result for SFPEs in [\[5,](#page-51-12) Theorem 3.8], the Feynman–Kac representation result for viscosity solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs in Proposition [2.23,](#page-23-0) and the uniqueness result in Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) to establish Theorem [3.7,](#page-41-1) the main result of this article. We conclude this article by presenting in Corollary [3.9](#page-44-0) and Corollary [3.11](#page-47-0) in Section [3.3](#page-41-0) below a few illustrative applications of Theorem [3.7.](#page-41-1)

## <span id="page-3-0"></span>2 Linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov partial differential equations (PDEs)

In this section we recall the definitions of a viscosity subsolution (see Definition [2.5](#page-8-1) in Section [2.2](#page-8-0) below), of a viscosity supersolution (see Definition [2.6](#page-8-2) in Section [2.2](#page-8-0) below), and of a viscosity solution (see Definition [2.7](#page-9-0) in Section [2.2](#page-8-0) below) in the case of a suitable class of degenerate parabolic PDEs, which in particular includes linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs as special cases, and we establish in Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) in Section [2.5](#page-20-0) below a Feynman–Kac type representation result for viscosity solutions of such linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs. The Feynman–Kac type representation result in Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) in Section [2.5](#page-20-0) will be employed in our proof of Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) in Section [3.3](#page-41-0) below, the main result of this article. Our proof of Proposition [2.23,](#page-23-0) in turn, is based on the combination of the following three essentially well-known results: (i) the existence and Feynman–Kac type representation result for classical solutions of certain linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs in Lemma [2.2](#page-5-0) in Section [2.1](#page-4-0) below, (ii) the approximation result for viscosity solutions of degenerate parabolic PDEs in Corollary [2.20](#page-17-0) in Section [2.3](#page-15-0) below, and (iii) the approximation result for solutions of SDEs in Lemma [2.21](#page-18-1) in Section [2.4](#page-18-0) below.

In Section [2.1](#page-4-0) we establish in the essentially well-known result in Lemma [2.2](#page-5-0) that a linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDE with smooth and compactly supported drift and diffusion coefficients, with a smooth terminal condition, and with a smooth inhomogeneity admits a classical solution. For the sake of completeness we also provide in Section [2.1](#page-4-0) a detailed proof for Lemma [2.2.](#page-5-0) In Section [2.2](#page-8-0) we specify in Definitions [2.4](#page-8-3) and [2.7](#page-9-0) below the well-known notions of a degenerate elliptic function and of a viscosity solution (cf. also, for example, Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Sections 2 and 8], Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Section 4.1 and Definition 4.1], and Peng [\[40,](#page-53-9) Definition 1.2 in Appendix C]) which are used in this article. In addition, in Section [2.2](#page-8-0) we also briefly recall in Lemma [2.8,](#page-9-1) Lemma [2.9,](#page-9-2) Lemma [2.10,](#page-10-0) Lemma [2.16,](#page-13-0) and Lemma [2.17](#page-14-0) some elementary and well-known properties of viscosity solutions which are employed later on in this article. In particular, Lemma [2.8](#page-9-1) recalls that every classical solution is also a viscosity solution, Lemma [2.9](#page-9-2) recalls an equivalent characterization for the notion of a viscosity subsolution, Lemma [2.10](#page-10-0) proves, roughly speaking, that under suitable assumptions the notion of a viscosity subsolution in Definition [2.5](#page-8-1) is consistent with the notion of a viscosity subsolution in Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Definition 4.1], and Lemma [2.16](#page-13-0)

and Lemma [2.17](#page-14-0) provide an equivalent characterization for the notion of a viscosity subsolution based on the notion of a parabolic superjet, which we briefly recall in Definition [2.11](#page-11-0) (cf. also Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Section 8] and Peng [\[40,](#page-53-9) Appendix C]). In Section [2.3](#page-15-0) we establish in the essentially well-known results in Lemma [2.18,](#page-15-1) Corollary [2.19,](#page-16-0) and Corollary [2.20](#page-17-0) (cf., e.g., Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Lemma 6.1], Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Lemma 4.8], and Imbert & Silvestre [\[26,](#page-52-5) Proposition 2.3.11]) approximation results for viscosity subsolutions, viscosity supersolutions, and viscosity solutions. Our proof of Lemma [2.18](#page-15-1) is strongly inspired by Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Lemma 4.8] (cf. also Barles & Perthame [\[4,](#page-51-13) Theorem A.2]), Corollary [2.19](#page-16-0) is a rather direct consequence of Lemma [2.18,](#page-15-1) and Corollary [2.20](#page-17-0) follows immediately from Lemma [2.18](#page-15-1) and Corollary [2.19.](#page-16-0) In Section [2.4](#page-18-0) we recall in Lemma [2.21](#page-18-1) an essentially well-known result on the continuous dependence of solutions of SDEs on their initial values. In Section [2.5](#page-20-0) we establish in Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) an existence result for viscosity solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs. Our proof of Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) employs Lemma [2.22](#page-20-1) together with the approximation result for viscosity solutions of degenerate parabolic PDEs in Corollary [2.20.](#page-17-0) Lemma [2.22,](#page-20-1) in turn, uses the existence and Feynman–Kac type representation result for classical solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs in Lemma [2.2,](#page-5-0) the approximation result for viscosity solutions of degenerate parabolic PDEs in Corollary [2.20,](#page-17-0) and the approximation result for solutions of SDEs in Lemma [2.21.](#page-18-1)

### <span id="page-4-0"></span>2.1 Existence results for classical solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs

<span id="page-4-1"></span>**Lemma 2.1.** Let  $d, m \in \mathbb{N}$ ,  $L, T \in (0, \infty)$ ,  $\xi \in \mathbb{R}^d$ , let  $\|\cdot\| : \mathbb{R}^d \to [0, \infty)$  be the standard Euclidean norm on  $\mathbb{R}^d$ , let  $\|\cdot\|$ :  $\mathbb{R}^{d \times m} \to [0, \infty)$  be the Frobenius norm on  $\mathbb{R}^{d \times m}$ , let  $\mu \in C([0, T] \times$  $(\mathbb{R}^d, \mathbb{R}^d), \sigma \in C([0, T] \times \mathbb{R}^d, \mathbb{R}^{d \times m})$  satisfy for all  $t \in [0, T]$ ,  $x, y \in \mathbb{R}^d$  that  $\|\mu(t, x) - \mu(t, y)\|$  +  $\|\sigma(t,x)-\sigma(t,y)\|\leqslant L\|x-y\|,$  let  $g\colon\mathbb{R}^d\to\mathbb{R}$  be  $\mathcal{B}(\mathbb{R}^d)/\mathcal{B}(\mathbb{R})$ -measurable, let  $h\colon[0,T]\times\mathbb{R}^d\to\mathbb{R}$ be  $\mathcal{B}([0,T]\times\mathbb{R}^d)/\mathcal{B}(\mathbb{R})$ -measurable, let  $\mathcal{O}\subseteq\mathbb{R}^d$  be an open set which satisfies  $(\text{supp}(\mu)\cup\text{supp}(\sigma))\subseteq$  $\overline{[0,T]} \times \mathcal{O}$ , assume that  $\sup(\{|g(x)| + |h(t,x)| : t \in [0,T], x \in \overline{\mathcal{O}}\} \cup \{0\}) < \infty$ , assume for all  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$ that  $\int_0^T |h(t,x)| dt < \infty$ , let  $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P}, (\mathbb{F}_t)_{t \in [0,T]})$  be a stochastic basis, let  $W : [0,T] \times \Omega \to \mathbb{R}^m$  be a standard  $(\mathbb{F}_t)_{t \in [0,T]}$ -Brownian motion, and let  $X = (X_t)_{t \in [0,T]}$ :  $[0,T] \times \Omega \to \mathbb{R}^d$  be an  $(\mathbb{F}_t)_{t \in [0,T]}$ adapted stochastic process with continuous sample paths satisfying that for all  $t \in [0, T]$  we have  $\mathbb{P}\text{-}a.s.$  that

X_t = \xi + \int_0^t \mu(s, X_s) \, ds + \int_0^t \sigma(s, X_s) \, dW_s. \tag{4}

Then

*Proof of Lemma [2.1.](#page-4-1)* To prove [\(5\)](#page-4-2) we distinguish between the case  $\xi \in \mathbb{R}^d \setminus \mathcal{O}$  and the case  $\xi \in \mathcal{O}$ . We first prove [\(5\)](#page-4-2) in the case  $\xi \in \mathbb{R}^d \backslash \mathcal{O}$ . Note that the assumption that  $(\text{supp}(\mu) \cup \text{supp}(\sigma)) \subseteq$  $[0, T] \times \mathcal{O}$  ensures that  $\mathbb{P}(\forall t \in [0, T] : X_t = \xi) = 1$  (cf., e.g., [\[5,](#page-51-12) Item (i) in Lemma 3.4]). Combining this with the assumption that for all  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$  we have that  $\int_0^T |h(t,x)| dt < \infty$  shows that

$$
\mathbb{E}\bigg[|g(X_T)| + \int_0^T |h(t, X_t)| \, dt\bigg] = |g(\xi)| + \int_0^T |h(t, \xi)| \, dt < \infty. \tag{6}
$$

This establishes [\(5\)](#page-4-2) in the case  $\xi \in \mathbb{R}^d \setminus \mathcal{O}$ . Next we prove (5) in the case  $\xi \in \mathcal{O}$ . Observe that the assumption that  $(\text{supp}(\mu) \cup \text{supp}(\sigma)) \subseteq [0, T] \times \mathcal{O}$  yields that  $\mathbb{P}(\forall t \in [0, T] : X_t \in \overline{\mathcal{O}}) = 1$  (cf., e.g., [\[5,](#page-51-12) Item (ii) in Lemma 3.4]). Combining this with the assumption that  $\sup(\{|g(x)| + |h(t, x)| : t \in$   $[0, T], x \in \overline{\mathcal{O}} \cup \{0\}$  <  $\infty$  assures that we have that

\mathbb{E}\bigg[|g(X_T)| + \int_0^T |h(t, X_t)| \, dt\bigg] \leqslant \bigg[\sup_{x \in \overline{\mathcal{O}}} |g(x)|\bigg] + T\left[\sup_{t \in [0,T]} \sup_{x \in \overline{\mathcal{O}}} |h(t,x)|\right] < \infty. \tag{7}
$$

Then we say that G is degenerate elliptic on  $(0, T) \times \mathcal{O} \times \mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{R}^d \times \mathbb{S}_d$  (we say that G is degenerate elliptic) if and only if

## <span id="page-26-0"></span>3 Semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs

In this section we establish in Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) in Section [3.3](#page-41-0) below, the main result of this article, a one-to-one correspondence between suitable solutions of certain SFPEs and suitable viscosity solutions of certain semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs and we thereby obtain an existence, uniqueness, and Feynman–Kac type representation result for viscosity solutions of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs. Our proof of Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) employs the following four constituents: (i) the existence and uniqueness result for solutions of SFPEs in [\[5,](#page-51-12) Theorem 3.8], (ii) the Feynman–Kac type representation result for viscosity solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs in Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) in Section [2.5](#page-20-0) above, (iii) the uniqueness result for viscosity solutions of suitable degenerate parabolic PDEs in Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) in Section [3.1](#page-27-0) below, and (iv) the existence and uniqueness result for solutions of SDEs in Proposition [3.6](#page-39-1) in Section [3.2](#page-39-0) below.

In Section [3.1](#page-27-0) we establish in Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) under suitable assumptions that a semilinear Kolmogorov PDE with Lipschitz continuous nonlinearity possesses at most one viscosity solution which satisfies a certain growth condition. Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) generalizes Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Corollary 4.14] with respect to the possible time dependence of the drift and diffusion coefficient functions of the PDE as well as with respect to the possible appearance of a one-sided Lipschitz continuous nonlinearity in the PDE. Our proof of Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) is strongly inspired by Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Section 4.3]. Our proof of Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) employs the comparison result for viscosity sub- and supersolutions of suitable degenerate parabolic PDEs in Corollary [3.4.](#page-33-0) Corollary [3.4,](#page-33-0) in turn, is a rather direct consequence of Lemma [3.3.](#page-29-0) Our proof of Lemma [3.3](#page-29-0) is strongly inspired by, e.g., Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Section 8], Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Corollary 4.11], and Imbert & Silvestre [\[26,](#page-52-5) Section 2.3]. For completeness we provide in Section [3.1](#page-27-0) a detailed proof for Lemma [3.3.](#page-29-0) Our proof of Lemma [3.3](#page-29-0) is based on the well-known result in Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Proposition 3.7] (cf. also Hairer et al. [\[18,](#page-52-0) Lemma 4.9]), which we recall in Lemma [3.1](#page-27-1) below, and on a special case of the result in Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Theorem 8.3] (cf. also Peng [\[40,](#page-53-9) Theorem 2.1 in Appendix C]), which we recall in Lemma [3.2](#page-27-2) below. In Section [3.2](#page-39-0) we establish in Proposition [3.6](#page-39-1) an existence result for solutions of SDEs with drift and diffusion coefficient functions which satisfy certain Lipschitz and coercivity type conditions. Proposition [3.6](#page-39-1) is essentially well-known in the scientific literature (see, e.g., Gyöngy & Krylov [\[17,](#page-52-12) Corollary 2.6]). For completeness we provide in Section [3.2](#page-39-0) a detailed proof for Proposition [3.6.](#page-39-1) In Section [3.3](#page-41-0) we establish in Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) an existence, uniqueness, and Feynman–Kac type representation result for viscosity solutions of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs. Our proof of Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) is based on the existence and uniqueness result for solutions of SFPEs in [\[5,](#page-51-12) Theorem 3.8], the Feynman–Kac type representation result for viscosity solutions of linear inhomogeneous Kolmogorov PDEs in Proposition [2.23](#page-23-0) in Section [2.5,](#page-20-0) the uniqueness result for viscosity solutions in Proposition [3.5](#page-34-0) in Section [3.1,](#page-27-0) and the existence and uniqueness result for solutions of SDEs in Proposition [3.6](#page-39-1) in Section [3.2.](#page-39-0) We conclude this article by providing in Corollary [3.8,](#page-43-0) Corollary [3.9,](#page-44-0) and Corollary [3.11](#page-47-0) below several sample applications of Theorem [3.7.](#page-41-1)

## <span id="page-27-0"></span>3.1 Uniqueness results for viscosity solutions of semilinear Kolmogorov PDEs

<span id="page-27-1"></span>**Lemma 3.1.** Let  $d \in \mathbb{N}$ , let  $\|\cdot\| : \mathbb{R}^d \to [0, \infty)$  be a norm on  $\mathbb{R}^d$ , let  $\mathcal{O} \subseteq \mathbb{R}^d$  be a non-empty set, let  $\eta: \mathcal{O} \to \mathbb{R}$  be upper semi-continuous, let  $\phi: \mathcal{O} \to [0, \infty)$  be lower semi-continuous, assume that  $\inf_{\alpha\in(0,\infty)}[\sup_{y\in\mathcal{O}}(\eta(y)-\alpha\phi(y))] \in \mathbb{R}$ , and let  $x=(x_\alpha)_{\alpha\in(0,\infty)}: (0,\infty) \to \mathcal{O}$  satisfy that

- <span id="page-27-6"></span>(i) we have that  $\limsup_{\alpha\to\infty} [\alpha\phi(x_\alpha)] = 0$  and
- (ii) we have for all  $\mathfrak{x} \in \mathcal{O}$  and all  $\alpha_n \in (0, \infty)$ ,  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ , with  $\limsup_{n \to \infty} ||x_{\alpha_n} \mathfrak{x}|| = 0 < \infty$  $\liminf_{n\to\infty} \alpha_n$  that  $\phi(\mathfrak{x})=0$  and  $\eta(\mathfrak{x})=\lim_{\alpha\to\infty} \left[\sup_{y\in\mathcal{O}}(\eta(y)-\alpha\phi(y))\right]=\sup_{y\in\phi^{-1}(0)}\eta(y)$ .

*Proof of Lemma [3.1.](#page-27-1)* Throughout this proof let  $S_\alpha \in (-\infty, \infty]$ ,  $\alpha \in (0, \infty)$ , and  $\varepsilon_\alpha \in [0, \infty]$ ,  $\alpha \in$  $(0, \infty)$ , satisfy for all  $\alpha \in (0, \infty)$  that

Observe that [\(156\)](#page-27-3) assures that for all  $\alpha \in (0, \infty)$  we have that  $S_{\alpha} = \eta(x_{\alpha}) - \alpha \phi(x_{\alpha}) + \varepsilon_{\alpha}$ . Moreover, note that [\(155\)](#page-27-4) ensures that  $\lim_{\alpha\to\infty} S_\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$  and  $\liminf_{\alpha\to\infty} \varepsilon_\alpha = \limsup_{\alpha\to\infty} \varepsilon_\alpha = 0$ . Hence, we obtain that there exists  $\mathfrak{a} \in (0, \infty)$  such that  $\left(\bigcup_{\alpha \in [\mathfrak{a}, \infty)} \{S_{\alpha}, \varepsilon_{\alpha}\}\right) \subseteq \mathbb{R}$ . \leq \limsup_{\alpha \to \infty} \left[ \sup_{y \in \mathcal{O}} \left( \eta(y) - \frac{\alpha}{2} \phi(y) \right) - \left( \eta(x_{\alpha}) - \alpha \phi(x_{\alpha}) \right) \right] = \limsup_{\alpha \to \infty} \left( S_{\alpha/2} - S_{\alpha} + \varepsilon_{\alpha} \right) = 0. \tag{157}
$$

This establishes Item [\(i\)](#page-27-5). It remains to establish Item [\(ii\)](#page-27-6). For this let  $\mathfrak{x} \in \mathcal{O}$  and let  $\alpha_n \in (0, \infty)$ ,  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ , satisfy lim  $\inf_{n\to\infty} \alpha_n = \infty$  and  $\limsup_{n\to\infty} ||x_{\alpha_n} - \mathfrak{x}|| = 0$ . Note that [\(157\)](#page-27-7) ensures that  $\liminf_{\alpha\to\infty}\phi(x_\alpha) = \limsup_{\alpha\to\infty}\phi(x_\alpha) = 0.$  Combining this with the assumption that  $\phi$  is lower semi-continuous demonstrates that

0 \leq \phi(\mathfrak{x}) \leq \liminf_{n \to \infty} \phi(x_{\alpha_n}) = 0. \tag{158}

\eta(\mathfrak{x}) \geq \limsup_{n \to \infty} \eta(x_{\alpha_n}) \geq \limsup_{n \to \infty} (\eta(x_{\alpha_n}) - \alpha_n \phi(x_{\alpha_n})) = \limsup_{n \to \infty} (S_{\alpha_n} - \varepsilon_{\alpha_n})

\lim_{n \to \infty} S_{\alpha_n} \geq \sup_{y \in \phi^{-1}(0)} \eta(y) \geq \eta(\mathfrak{x}).

<span id="page-27-2"></span>This and [\(158\)](#page-27-8) establish Item [\(ii\)](#page-27-6). This completes the proof of Lemma [3.1.](#page-27-1)

Crandall et al. [\[9,](#page-51-5) Theorem 8.3] (applied with  $k \leftarrow k$ ,  $u_i \leftarrow v_i$ ,  $\mathcal{O}_i \leftarrow \mathcal{O}, \varphi \leftarrow \Psi, \hat{t} \leftarrow T - \mathfrak{t}, \hat{x} \leftarrow \mathfrak{x}$ for  $i \in \{1, 2, \ldots, k\}$  in the notation of Crandall et al. and

Itô's formula hence guarantees that for all  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ ,  $t \in [0, T]$  we have P-a.s. that

&= \alpha\left[-\frac{d}{2(\alpha t+\varepsilon)} - \frac{\|x\|^2}{2(\alpha t+\varepsilon)^2}\right]V(t,x) + \frac{1}{2}\left[\frac{\langle x,B(t,x)[B(t,x)]^*x\rangle}{(\alpha t+\varepsilon)^2} + \frac{\operatorname{Trace}(B(t,x)[B(t,x)]^*)}{\alpha t+\varepsilon}\right].\n\end{split} \tag{285}
$$

Next note that the assumption that for all  $t \in [0, T]$ ,  $x, \xi \in \mathbb{R}^d$  we have that  $\langle \xi, B(t, x) [B(t, x)]^* \xi \rangle \leq$  $c \leq \mathcal{E} \leq \mathcal{E}$  implies that for all  $t \in [0, T]$ ,  $x \in \mathbb{R}^d$  we have that  $\text{Trace}(B(t, x)[B(t, x)]^*) \leq c d$ . Combining this, [\(306\)](#page-50-1), and [\(307\)](#page-50-2) with the fact that W is a standard Brownian motion, the fact that for all  $\varepsilon \in (0, \frac{1}{2a} - cT)$  we have that  $u \in \mathcal{V}_{\varepsilon}$ , and Item [\(iii\)](#page-48-6) in Theorem [3.7](#page-41-1) proves that  $u = w$ . This establishes Items [\(ii\)](#page-48-5) and (iii).<br>This completes the proof of Corollary 3.11. This completes the proof of Corollary [3.11.](#page-47-0)

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
